Paving Professional Success



A few years ago, Michael Magdy found a place at L'Arche's café and guesthouse in Alexandria, Egypt. "I made drinks, I served drinks. I maintained the accounts."

"When he first joined, he was quite shy", recalls Aida Saleh, a staff member at the café. "Even when he said good morning, it seemed he lacked confidence."

But it wasn't long before the new job in a supportive community brought a positive effect. Vocational assistant Christine Shawkey explains that "over time... Michael began talking more with us all. He even started making jokes. He wasn't afraid anymore to make mistakes." His colleagues paint a picture of a valued co-worker, whose skills and commitment make him a gift to the hospitality industry: "He always likes to help", says Youssef Aseel, a long-term guest at the hotel.

"So the days when Michael is not here, we feel something strange: where is Michael? We feel someone is missing!" It is clear that Michael had found not just a job but a place of belonging: "I work with great people- the work at L'Arche is fulfilling."

The guesthouse coordinator, David Fawzi, saw that Michael might be ready for his next professional steps. "We want people with disabilities to be able, just like anyone else, to live their lives as independently as possible." Not long after, the link was made with Xlab, an advertising agency in Alexandria.

Next Steps

Xlab was looking for a new staff member on their hospitality team. "As we got to know [Michael], we discovered a very friendly individual and a dedicated employee who consistently keeps his appointments" recalls Samer Battah. "On a professional level, he has a positive influence on the workplace, always willing to help others."

Michael's story is about personal courage and determination. It shows how partnerships, professional support, and long-term programs can create new opportunities. And it shows how positive experiences and relationships can drive social change.

His journey is one of shared learning, growing awareness, and deepening understanding. It puts the idea of equal opportunity into action in every day life. Michael's experience tells the story not only of an open door and path for him, but also for others. By changing how people see, teach, and help one another, every partnership has the power not only to transform lives, but to change the world.

our Charter, Our Map Formation Program

In April, twenty-five participants from ten communities in eight countries (Syria, Honduras, New Zealand, Egypt, Spain, Germany, France, UK) travelled to Drongen in Belgium for a formation session led by the International Formation Team.



Living our Values

These leaders with and without disabilities worked together for a week in sessions focused on the new Charter.

This experiential learning session was designed with a curriculum and schedule that exemplified the core values and practices of L'Arche.

L'Arche communities live out the Charter as a vibrant expression of our shared values – deepening care for one another, acting responsibly for society and the earth, and integrating spirituality into daily life.

Great Voices Group

Launched in 2024, the Great Voices Group is an inclusive, international group of members with and without disabilities that works directly with the International Leadership Team.

The group meets bi-monthly with members of the International Leadership Team to review, discuss, and offer informed perspectives on topics of importance for the Federation. Currently, the group includes members from India, Zimbabwe, Poland, Germany, Canada, USA, UK, and France.

Voice, Contribution, and Inclusion

People with intellectual disabilities are fully included and their voices shape community life and the Federation – they are recognized as contributors and leaders.



Growing Together and Sharing Wisdom

Communities are spaces of mutual learning and transformation—where people of all abilities and backgrounds grow through lived experience, spiritual reflection, and the exchange of wisdom across cultures and generations.




TwidSA Self-advocacy

Funded by the EU Erasmus + program, "Together With and Without Disability in Self-Advocacy" is a ground-breaking project funded to empower youth leaders with and without intellectual disabilities.

In 2024 a total of 24 youth leaders from four countries participated in three online trainings and one in-person training held in Croatia. These trainings were a preparation phase, getting the youth leaders ready to in turn facilitate and host local youth exchange events in 2025 and 2026.

They are planning sixteen online events, reaching approximately 1,600 young people from Croatia, Egypt, France and Palestine."

Emergency Response

L'Arche continues to organize emergency humanitarian aid to our communities in need, including Haiti, Ukraine and Palestine.

For example, in Haiti the situation remains very tense with significant challenges. It is an immense support to L'Arche friends to know that they are not alone. Ongoing financial support allows L'Arche to meet the basic needs of our members with a disability in this time of crisis, including food, shelter and quality of care and community.

Care and Support for all

People in L'Arche receive high-quality, person-centered support that ensures their dignity, health, and safety, while communities act to protect rights, expand opportunities, and care for our society.



Inclusive Leadership in Honduras

In Choluteca, Honduras, a Board made up of elected core members was formed this year in order to facilitate and intentionally support members with a disability to take the lead in planning activities and making decisions together for the community.

This inclusive Board supports decision-making for community planning and activity.

The development of inclusive board work and committees across L'Arche is founded on the principles and approaches of inclusive leadership and decision-making and promotes autonomy, social equity, and opportunity.

Youth and Family Outreach

Youth and families are actively working with L'Arche communities –contributing to changed perceptions, stronger networks, and better support for all generations.

Family Outreach in Africa

2024 was the first full year of a three-year project called 'Inclu'R Afrique.' This project has been made possible by a multi-year grant from the Agence Francaise de Developpement (AFD) and additional supporting partners to empower L'Arche family outreach work in Kenya, Ivory Coast, Zimbabwe and Egypt.

L'Arche project members conduct family visits; they provide much-needed support and bring educational tools and resources to help raise awareness, understanding, and acceptance where it is needed. The project is helping to break down social stigma and its potentially disasterous consequences and has been praised by members and participants alike.

In addition, the outreach program seeks to raise awareness among the general public, medical and social service professionals and other key stakeholders, in order to combat stigma, discrimination, and violence. It aims to train and support health providers about disabilities, the referral system, interventions and supports, and follow up. Often the outreach teams bring practical help such as physiotherapy exercises, food, or medical provisions.

In year one:

- 260 families were supported with home visits and/or specific support
- 160 youth or adults with disabilities received a health service
- 630 caregivers, teachers and health workers received training and awareness sessions to help combat stigma, discrimination and violence
- 560 people participated in public events to promote the rights of people with disabilities

Family Outreach:

The Story of Mokan, Marwin and Tricha Ivory Coast

In the neighborhood of Tollakouadiokro in Bouaké, Mokan, a courageous mother who friends refer to as "little mom" in Baoulé, struggles every day to give her children, Marwin and Tricha, a better life.

Marwin and Tricia are seven year old twins with autism. They live with their mother and maternal grandparents.

Mokan's path is marked by extraordinary resilience. A survivor of a machete attack that left physical and emotional scars, she embodies a silent strength. "I thought my life had ended that day," she confides. "But my children gave me a reason to fight, a reason to keep going."

A decisive turning point

It is thanks to the Inclu'R Afrique project (page 13) implemented by L'Arche Bouaké, that this story takes a transformative turn. This project aims to promote the inclusion and resilience of people living with intellectual disabilities. It includes a home visit program to support families with children with intellectual disabilities. For Mokan and her family, these home visits marked a real turning point.

Marwin, fascinated by the tablets, began using images to express his thoughts, breaking down a communication barrier that seemed insurmountable. "When I saw Marwin use the tablet to show me what he wanted to say, I cried," Mokan says, moved. "For the first time, I felt like I could truly understand my son."

Dedicated professionals, including an educator and a social worker, work with the family to build adapted programs and offer activities that meet the specific needs of each child. Tricha finds peace and confidence through coloring and interactive games that help her develop her social skills.

A journey of transformation and hope

As the months passed, remarkable progress emerged. The team not only supported the children, but also equipped Mokan, offering her techniques for managing stress and better understanding her children. Little by little, family bonds strengthened. The grandparents, rich in their experience, shared their knowledge, supporting a positive family dynamic.

With the continued support of the project, Marwin and Tricha now venture beyond the walls of their home. They participate in community activities, discover new friendships, and gain confidence. This integration process marks a crucial step towards their social inclusion.

"Seeing my children smile and play with other children is a miracle for me," Mokan explains proudly. "I realize that we are not alone and that anything is possible with a little help."

A Productive Garden in Asansol, India

In 2024 L'Arche Asansol took significant steps to install a large garden plot, in order to grow food for the community and for market sales.

But the unpredictable heavy rains and cyclones outside of the monsoon season were frequently damaging the plants and disrupting the garden's productivity.

Further investment allowed them to plan for the purchase of removable tents to protect the garden from extreme weather.

This is expected to boost productivity and higher quality produce, both of which will benefit both the community's autonomous production of food for themselves and their public engagement through market sales.



Building Agriculture in Tegucigalpa, Honduras

L'Arche Tegucigalpa launched a new program in a rural village, several hours outside the city.

The connection with this village came about because a young man had migrated from the village to the city and found work in the small business owned by the Board Chair of L'Arche Honduras.

By working there, he came to know L'Arche and observe our way of being together. When he returned home, he saw people in a new light. He asked L'Arche to help him support families who had a loved one with a disability. Members of L'Arche began meeting with families in the village. Together, they decided to start an egg layer social entrepreneurship.

The most important part of this project is that the work is being done together with the young adults with disabilities in the community. One father explains "Here people with disabilities have been left out. But now, little by little they are being included. Please keep helping."



Engaging society through the arts



Meet Il Chicco SBand: bit.ly/chicco_sband the inclusive improvisation band band from L'Arche in Rome reaching youth in schools and audiences of all ages with their joy and talent.

Opening up new horizons is what the Sband does best - both for its members and for the many children and teachers in the city schools that invite them to give a concert. One such teacher is Manuela Urso:

"We teachers spend our lives raising awareness of children about the value of altruism, helping others, being collaborative, cooperative. But these can remain on a very theoretical level as topics for discussion. Therefore, I wanted the children to learn by living an experience in reality, starting from the concrete."

Manuela recalls the impact the Sband made on her pupils; writing up the experience afterwards, most of them said at the beginning that they had a little fear.

"But then it was so spontaneous and natural that they found themselves experiencing a lot of joyful emotions. They made beautiful drawings, and I remember in particular two or three children who wrote really insightful things. **This experience will have a lasting impact.**"

Not surprisingly, the growing popularity of the Sband has brought a full programme of concerts, not just in schools but to wider audiences. They recently played at their largest venue to date: the World Jazz Day at the Parco della Musica Auditorium in Rome!

"The Sband is about being surprised by the beauty of the other, by the abilities of the other. It is about leaving ajar the door of surprise, of possibility for the other person, so that they can evolve, and show how they are changing in complete beauty." Loredana, founder of the Sband.

The Charter of L'Arche

L'Arche holds special consultative status with the U.N. Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). This means our Federation holds both the privilege and the responsibility to speak to issues that impact the daily life of our members and to help further the work of the Convention of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD).

In 2024, history was made at the 17th annual Conference of States Parties to the CRPD (COSPI7). In a remarkable first, the UN News team was joined by guest editor Nicholas Herd, a dedicated disability advocate and member of L'Arche Canada.

In collaboration with a joint team from L'Arche and UN News that included weeks of advance preparation and live coverage support, Nicholas led the news on this global conference. His interviews and perspectives included rapid responses to events and speeches and lifted the voices of conference delegates and representatives from around the international community.

CRPD

As an international human rights treaty, the CRPD reaffirms that all people with disabilities must be holders of all human rights and freedoms, and that there should not exist barriers in society that limit their participation.

Raising Public Awareness and Engagement

People with intellectual disabilities are visible and heard in public life – shaping new narratives through storytelling, advocacy, and inclusive media.



A Leading Voice in Poland

Anna Przybysławska is a member of L'Arche in Wroclaw, Poland. Here, Anna shares her story and talks about what community life is like and what life with an intellectual disability is like in Poland. She talks about being a self-advocate and the importance of social solidarity and building bridges:

In Poland, people with disabilities are often excluded from society and are just expected to stay at home, but this is not the case in Wroclaw's L'Arche community. We all share daily life together.

All of us do activities outside of the houses. Many members of my community attend a program where they learn practical and social skills, and other members go to a workshop in the community where they make beautiful handcrafts. Some of us have paid jobs, some of us are volunteers. Having a job or a meaningful activity as a person with a disability is important because it helps you feel more confident and independent.



New employers may not want to employ people with disabilities. The problem often is that people without disabilities have little knowledge about disability. Our community works to change this.

We work with children, students and adults to educate them.

Stopping prejudice and changing how society treats people with disabilities is an important task. I am often invited to conferences, assemblies and meetings where I act as a representative for people with disabilities. We need more people who are willing to build bridges. I believe that we all need each other and have a lot to learn from each other.

If we all work together, we can do good and make a change.

I believe that it's of important value to create space for people with and without disabilities to meet and get to know each other... many different stereotypes can arise because we don't know each other very well.

Creating this space for meeting together where we can get to know each other and create these relationships, that's an important value.

If we all work together, we can do good and make a change.




